Maintained by fulfilling obligations to others

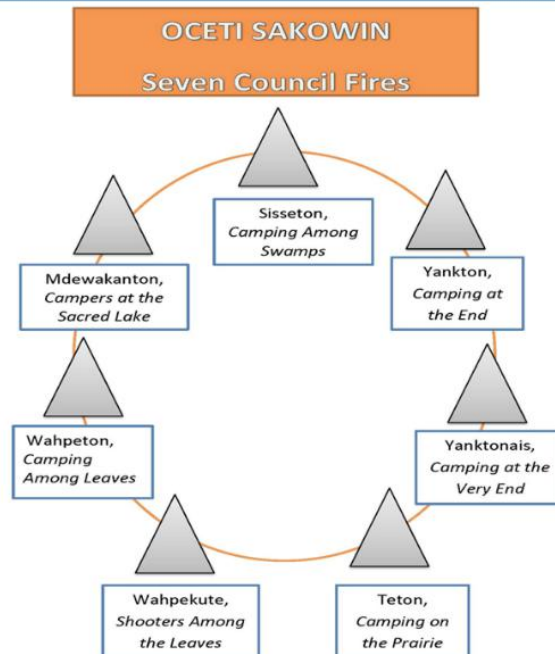
Resources

Constitution

A Constitution is the supreme law of a nation. It is the set of laws that are determined and agreed upon by the people. The Constitution will set out the powers and functions of WDFN Government in relation to how they govern the people of Whitecap Dakota First Nation.

Traditional Dakota Governance

In the past, the Dakota were divided into groups occupying different areas throughout their traditional territory. There were many levels of government, ranging from family leaders to the local leaders who took care of each individual community. Also, they came together to make decisions as part of a government called the Oceti Sakowin. The names for each of the groups of the Oceti Sakowin are important because it gives the original location of each council fire.



Chief and Council

Strong leadership is important in creating stability for Whitecap Dakota First Nation. Chief and Council are voted in by the people of the community. Chief and Council work with the Elders, Advisory Councils, and community members to create social, economic, and cultural development opportunities for the Whitecap Dakota First Nation.

Chief Darcy Bear has served the Whitecap Community for 8 consecutive terms. Chief Bear's leadership is focused on financial accountability for Whitecap, self government, and job creation through partnerships.

Councillor Dwayns Eagle plays an active role in the economic development initiatives of the Whitecap Dakota First Nation. His portfolio includes; Health and Social Development, Child and Family Services, Whitecap Children's Center, Fire Protection, Justice, Residential School, Environmental and Hunting and Trapping.

Some key areas in which WDFN will have law-making powers under a final self-government agreement include:

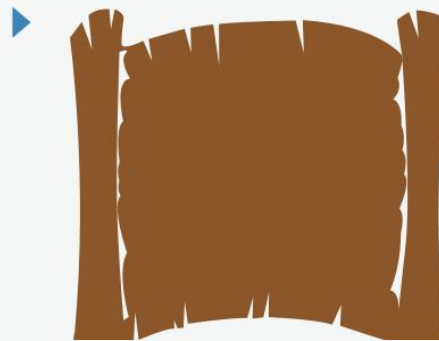

Self Government at Whitecap



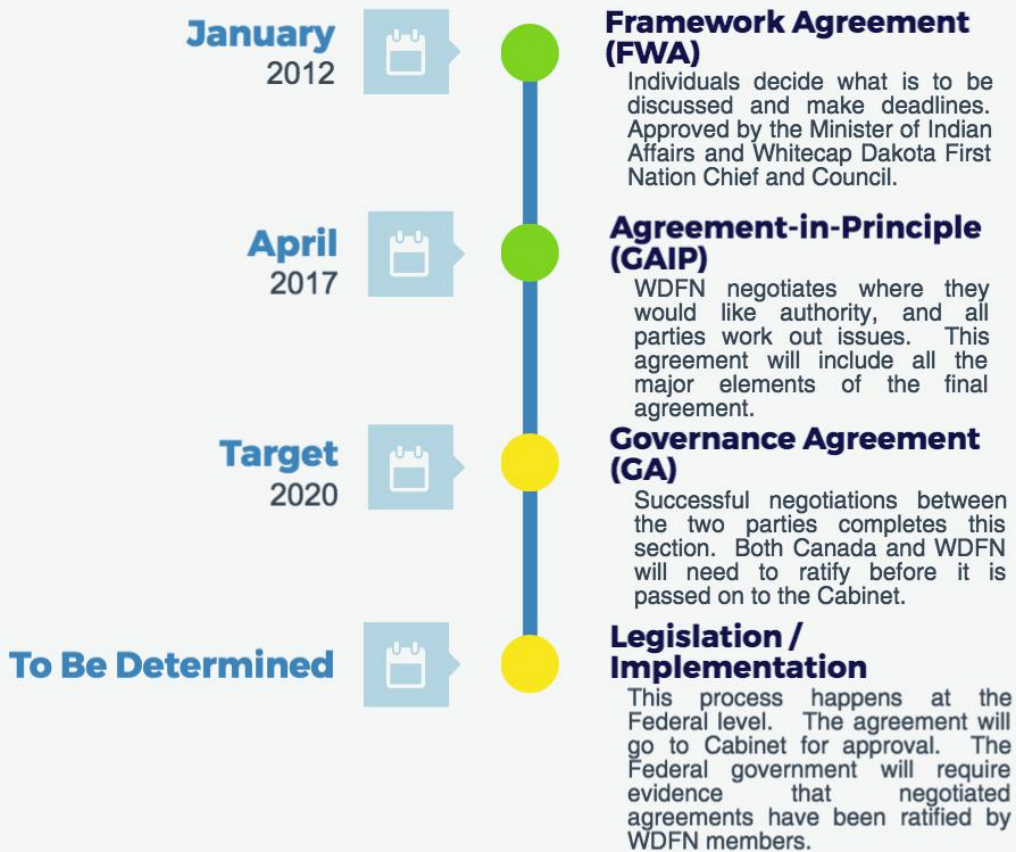
◀ Gives Whitecap Dakota First Nation power to develop and enforce their own laws on education, health, culture, finance, lands and more.

Frequently Ask Questions

1 Why would Whitecap pursue self government?

Self-government brings First Nations out from under the outdated Indian Act.

2 When will all 4 steps in the be completed?

Some self-government agreements can take up to 20 years to complete. WDFN and Canada are very optimistic that the Final Agreement will be completed by 2020.

3 How was the Constitution created?

Community committees ensured members' interests were reflected. Chief, Council and the Governance team are ensure that no details are overlooked.

4 How will Whitecap Dakota First Nation approve the Governance Agreement?

50% of the WDFN community must vote, and 50% of these voters must vote yes.
